✤ CIVIC AND COMMUNITY PROJECTS- PROJECT DOGWOOD:

Nancy McDaniel and Karen Santos finalized the Founders Fund allocation for the spring 2018 dogwood planting with Matt Sensabaugh, city horticulturist. He is working with city school superintendent and three elementary principals to plant nine trees at the schools. We will plant most of the remainder of the trees in Montgomery Hall Park. Matt is

currently ordering the trees and arranging for delivery in early spring. Finalizing the tree aspect provides specific money allocation for the remainder of the grant ideas. We have an idea for using some of the Founders Fund money for educational purposes and hopefully will be able to share this soon. Holly Bailey, Deneen Brannock, Matt, and others from the City are working on Founders Fund educational signage for the "living laboratories" in Gypsy Hill Park and Montgomery Hall Park.

Cordelia Gary and Laura Nordstrom are working with Karen and Nancy to finalize content for the Dogwood Project area of the AGC webpage. This will include history with images of Mr. Ruff, information from AGC archives, information about the dogwood cultivars, details of three grants received— including Founders Fund, an award honoring Matt Sensabaugh, and information about Club Challenge.

The Club Dogwood Challenge flier has been updated with information about each of the hardy cultivars. It is attached for your reference.

We are continuing to receive dogwood "selfies" from AGC members. Thank you Emily Cochran and Carol Shannon! Now we have three so far. Spring is coming, so please make plans to plant your tree(s).

Nancy and Karen have created a first draft of the Commonwealth Award application and are working on polishing this for board review and submission in March.

Now that the fundamental projects of Founder's Fund implementation, website information, Club Challenge, and Common Wealth Award application are almost completed, the committee is poised to move into some of the creative ideas we generated last August. Thanks to everyone for all their hard work.

Staunton's 1935 city manager, Mr. Ruff, had a vision to enhance the city with dogwoods and the Augusta Garden Club is reviving this tradition with a multi-year, multi-faceted dogwood restoration project.

PROJECT DOGWOOD CULTIVARS

PLANT A DOGWOOD!

Fall 2017 or Spring 2018 Four easy steps!

 Identify a place for your new dogwood....
your home or business; or donate one to someone or someplace.

2. Contact or visit a local nursery to select your tree. (See the list of project cultivars below.)

3. Plant your tree!

4. Take a selfie & send to AGC! We want to see your tree and post it on our website.



I. Cherokee Princess-White flowers that are quite large and bloom early.Vigorous and resistant to spot anthracnose, a leaf disease different than dogwood anthracnose.

2. Karen's Appalachian Blush- Fairly new cultivar resistant to powdery mildew. White flowers with a dusting of pink on the petals.

3. Jean's Appalachian Snow- Resistant to powdery mildew. Has large white flowers like Cherokee Princess; a new introduction with good fall color.

4. Cloud Nine- Not listed for any disease resistance but a very heavy flowering & fruiting tree. An old cultivar that goes back to the 1950's. It tends to grow slowly.

5. **Appalachian Spring**-White flowers and very slow growing. Resistant to dogwood anthracnose although susceptible to powdery mildew; red to purple fall color.

6. Cherokee Brave- Red/dark pink flowers with pale centers. Good resistance to powdery mildew.

7. Kay's Appalachian Mist- Resistant to powdery mildew, good fall color
